WHO DO YOU SAY THAT I AM?

JESUS' PERSONAL INVITATION TO YOU

Throughout the Gospels, Jesus is constantly inviting those who he meets into deeper relationship with him. To the first two disciples, Jesus invites them "To come and see." To the Apostle Philip, he invites him to "Follow me." And to the Apostle Peter, one of his invitations is in the form of a question, "Who do you say that I am?" Jesus also asks that question to all of us.

This question cannot have a textbook response, but rather needs an answer that is personal for each of us. In other words, if we were standing in front of Jesus and he asked us, "Who do you say that I am?," how would we respond in our own words?

If this question is difficult for us to answer, it could be for several reasons. Perhaps, we have been going through the motions of being Catholic, but have never encountered Jesus. Maybe, we have experienced Jesus, but have never heard the invitation of Jesus "To come and see" for one reason or another. It could be that we have been too busy with life to take time to have that conversation with Jesus and hear his invitation to follow him. We might also have an answer to the question, but feel that our answer is not good enough because it feels too rehearsed or too basic.


The good news is that you are not alone in struggling with this question. For centuries, even the saints have struggled to respond to Jesus' invitation, "Who do you say that I am?" All around the world, Christians and non-Christians alike are wrestling to respond to his question, including your neighbors and friends.

Our parish community is inviting you personally to take time to wrestle with Jesus' question, "Who do you say that I am?" during our upcoming Kerygma Evangelization Retreat taking place **October 11-16**.
